



2027 Doctoral Fellowship Application Guide

The two-year Louisville Institute Doctoral Fellowship invites Ph.D. and Th.D. **students currently in their first or second year of a doctoral program** to consider *theological education as a vocation*. Doctoral Fellows receive US\$3,000 each year for two years, and join with a peer cohort of other fellows for three formational gatherings each year as part of the Vocation of the Theological Educator (VTE) Initiative.

What are Doctoral Fellowships?

The two-year Louisville Institute Doctoral Fellowship invites current Ph.D. and Th.D. students in their first or second year of a doctoral program to consider *theological education as a vocation*. As part of the Louisville Institute's Vocation of the Theological Educator Initiative (VTE), Louisville Institute Doctoral Fellows receive a US\$3,000 grant each year for two years, and join with other fellows at three formational gatherings a year (October, January, and May). Approved travel and lodging expenses for participation in the VTE gatherings are covered by the Louisville Institute.

Preference for Doctoral Fellowships is given to students who demonstrate an interest in theological education as a vocation, who express an understanding of the current challenges and opportunities of theological education, and who articulate connections between their doctoral work and these trends and dynamics. The Louisville Institute understands theological education as encompassing the academic study and teaching of religion and its practices, as well as formation for ministry, leadership, social justice and public service, nonprofit and other agency work, etc.

What do we mean by "Theological Education"?

The Louisville Institute defines "theological education" broadly, encompassing the academic study and teaching of religion and its practices, as well as formation for ministry, leadership, social justice and public service, nonprofit and other agency work, etc.

Who is eligible for a Doctoral Fellowship?

Eligible Applicants:

- must, at the time they apply, be students in their first or second year of a Ph.D., Th.D., or pontifical S.T.D. program at an accredited graduate school in the United States or Canada. D.Min. students and others in non-research or practical degrees are not eligible for this fellowship;

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- must reside in the United States or Canada, and be U.S. or Canadian citizens or international students with an appropriate student visa to study in North America. Students enrolled in North American doctoral programs but living outside of the United States and Canada are not eligible;
- must have at least two years remaining in their program at the time they apply. Most applicants are in or have recently completed coursework when they apply. Those who have applied for but not yet started a doctoral program, or who are already writing their dissertations, are not eligible for this fellowship;
- are passionate about theological education and the future of the Christian church in North America;
- may work in a variety of disciplines (history, ethics, practical theology, biblical studies, etc.), or work interdisciplinarily

Additional Eligibility Requirements:

- Individuals may only apply for one LI grant or fellowship between June 1, 2026, and May 31, 2027.
- Any previous grants from the Louisville Institute must be completed and any final reports submitted before applying for another LI fellowship or grant.
- Members of the Louisville Presbyterian Theological Seminary staff, faculty, Board of Trustees, or student body or their immediate family members (parents, spouses, or children) are ineligible for Louisville Institute grants or fellowships. Members of the Louisville Institute Advisory Board and their immediate family members are also ineligible.
- Louisville Institute grantees may not simultaneously hold two individual grants or fellowships from Lilly Endowment-funded organizations that together total more than US\$55,000. Please contact us if you have questions about this stipulation: fellowships@louisville-institute.org.

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What is the Vocation of the Theological Educator Initiative (VTE)?

The heart of Louisville Institute's Vocation of the Theological Educator (VTE) Initiative is the conviction that theological schools and churches in North America need teacher-scholars who are attuned to both the life of the church and the life of a scholar. Many VTE participants are themselves ordained pastors or leaders in their religious communities and bring together convictions of the heart, mind, and spirit through their work in the academy and the church. At VTE gatherings, fellows participate in conversation, discernment, collegiality, and connection with other scholars and pastors to engage deep questions of theology, justice, pedagogy, ministry, and vocation.

The VTE Initiative comprises both Doctoral Fellows in the early stages of their doctoral programs, and Postdoctoral Fellows who have completed their degrees and are placed in two-year appointment throughout North America.

What are VTE Gatherings?

Three times a year (October, January, & May), LI Doctoral and Postdoctoral Fellows gather for vocational and professional formation, relationship building, and mutual support as part of the Vocation of the Theological Educator (VTE) Initiative. With their cohorts, fellows engage vocational questions about theological education, discernment, leadership, pedagogy, mentoring, research and writing, employment and tenure, public theology, guild participation, and other relevant issues. Through peer learning and in conversation with mentor-facilitators and invited resource persons, fellows together create space for dialogue, imagination, collegiality, and growth within and across the academy and the church. Approved travel and lodging expenses for participation in the VTE gatherings are covered by the Louisville Institute.

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How do I apply?

- All applications are submitted online through our application portal. Click the APPLY button and select “Doctoral Fellowship” to begin your application.
- Applications are due by 11:59 pm, ET March 1, 2027.
- Recommendation letters are due from your recommenders March 8, 2027.

What is the selection process?

- The Louisville Institute appoints a selection committee to review proposals and award Doctoral Fellowships. Selection takes place about 8 weeks after the application due date.
- Last year we received about 100 eligible applications for Doctoral Fellowships. In 2027, we will award 10 fellowships.
- All applicants will be notified by email as soon as possible following the selection process. Awards will be announced publicly in Spring 2027.
- Fellowship funds are dispersed in September of each award year.

What makes a strong application?

- Read the application materials and follow the instructions carefully. Make sure you meet the eligibility requirements before submitting an application.
- Competitive applications demonstrate an interest in and passion for theological education, a strong desire to explore vocation, and an awareness of the challenges and opportunities facing theological education in North America.
- Strong essays draw connections between the applicant’s vocational trajectories, doctoral program and focus, and trends and dynamics in the Christian church and in theological education.
- We encourage you to share your proposal with trusted advisors and colleagues – ideally those who will write your recommendation letters – to receive feedback and suggestions prior to submitting your application.

Preparing your application:

- 1. Read through all the application materials carefully.**
- 2. Prepare your application materials early** so that you can get feedback on your essay, request a copy of your transcript, and ask for recommendation letters.
- 3. Create an online profile on our application portal.** You will be asked to provide your name, contact information, and other information about yourself. If you have previously applied for a Louisville Institute program, make sure to update your contact information.
- 4. Once you have created your profile, click the "Apply" button and select "Doctoral Fellowship"** to begin entering the elements of your application.
- 5. Applications are due by 11:59 p.m. ET March 1, 2027.** We recommend that you put together the application elements in time to share them with friends or colleagues for feedback before submitting them. Please do your best to provide clear, refined, and edited documents, noting which elements should be submitted as PDFs.
- 6. Recommendation letters are due from the recommenders no later than March 8, 2027.** In the application portal you will be asked to provide contact information for your recommenders — name, email address, and phone number — and we will send them a link to upload their letters.

Application Requirements:

Doctoral Fellowship applications require the following elements. After you have created your online profile, you will be prompted to provide the following:

- 1. General information about your dissertation program and progress to date, including:**

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- The school you currently attend
- The degree you are pursuing (PhD, ThD, etc.)
- When you started your program (month, year)
- If you are attending full time or part time
- Your academic discipline/field
- The focus or subject of your anticipated dissertation research
- Keyword tags of 3-5 words to describe your anticipated dissertation research.
- Your doctoral progress: the dates you anticipate completing your coursework, comprehensive or qualifying exams, and receiving approval of your dissertation proposal or thesis topic.
- Other graduate degrees completed (Institution, degree & completion date)

2. **Application essay:** In an essay of no more than 1500 words (5–7 pages, double-spaced, 12-point font), describe your interest in theological education, how your experiences in theological education have influenced your sense of vocation, and your understanding of the significance and realities of theological education in the twenty-first century. From your perspective and social context, reflect on current dynamics and realities of theological education and the church, the possibilities and challenges ahead, and how you see your gifts, skills, and vocational goals within this larger context.

Additionally, please describe why a Louisville Institute Doctoral Fellowship and participation in the VTE program is of interest to you as you consider your vocation(s). In this essay, we are more interested in your ideas, analysis, and passion as a theological educator than a recitation of your résumé. Include your name on each page of the essay, number the pages, and upload the document as a PDF.

(Note: The Louisville Institute defines “theological education” broadly, encompassing the academic study and teaching of religion and its practices, as well as formation for ministry, leadership, social justice and public service, nonprofit and other agency work, etc.)

3. **Doctoral transcript:** One transcript (unofficial or official) from your doctoral program to date and must be uploaded to the application portal. Transcripts are due with the application, so make sure to request them in advance so they are received in time.

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4. Curriculum vitae or résumé: Provide a PDF of your CV or résumé (maximum four pages) including but not limited to:

- Institutions of higher education you've attended and degrees earned, including dates, starting with the most recent
- Teaching and/or employment experience, starting with the most recent
- Major academic honors you've received
- Titles and citations of your publications, starting with the most recent
- Other relevant experience that will help the selection committee get to know you, such as church leadership, guild membership, volunteer service, etc.

5. Two letters of recommendation, due from recommenders on March 8, 2027. In the online application portal, you will be asked to provide contact information (name, email address, and phone number) for your recommenders, and they will be sent a link by email through which they can upload letters. As soon as you submit contact information, your recommender will automatically receive that email. Make sure to contact your recommenders in advance to explain the fellowship and to share your application materials.

- **Faculty mentor/advisor letter of recommendation:** Your first letter of recommendation should come from your faculty mentor/advisor who will be asked to assess your doctoral work thus far, your vocational interest in theological education, and your promise as a teacher and scholar.
- **Second letter of recommendation:** Your second letter of recommendation should come from an academic mentor or colleague who can speak to your scholarly promise and assess the quality of your doctoral work and research. In addition, this recommender will be asked to comment on your personal qualities and commitments, including engagement with faith communities, if applicable.

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Completing the Application:

All elements of the application, including transcripts, must be submitted by **11:59 p.m. ET on March 1, 2027**, except the recommendation letters, which are due from the recommenders **March 8, 2027**. You can edit all portions of your application until the deadline, after which changes cannot be made. Late applications will not be accepted.
